

# Third win for Cabell

Joey Cabell of the Outrigger Canoe Club is a businessman who operates two restaurants on the Mainland.

But the Hawaii native hasn't allowed his business in Aspen, Colo., and Newport Beach, Calif., to interfere with the water sport he learned to love so well in Hawaii — surfing.

He has returned each December for the past several years to enter the International Surfing Championships at Makaha, a classic claimed by many "as the best on any shore."

His yearly jaunts to his native Island has been very productive for he has won the International event three times.

CABELL FIRST won the International title in 1963. He repeated last year and captured his third crown yesterday in waves ranging from six to 10 feet.

While Cabell's first two victories were by convincing margins, yesterday's win was a close one over second-place Fred Hemmings Jr., winner of the recent World Surfing at Puerto Rico.

The young restaurateur got the nod on the cards of three judges, while Hemmings got more points from two of the five officials.

Hemmings, a good sport, said he "respected the decision of the judges" and that he knew the judging would be close.

The closeness of yesterday's competition is attested by the fact that Cabell had left the scene of the meet and had to be called back to accept his laurels. "I am surprised," he said. "I thought Fred (Hemmings) had won it."

IN WINNING yesterday's

split decision, Cabell became the second surfer to win three meets in the International competition. George Downing, who finished fourth, won the title in 1954, '61 and '65.

Hemmings, however, boosted his stock for Surfer-of-the-Year honors with his second-place finish yesterday. In three major meets he finished first (World),

third (Duke) and second (International).

He also is from the Outrigger Canoe Club.

Corky Carroll of California was third, Brant Ackerman (Hawaii) fifth, Leroy Ah Choy (Hawaii) sixth and Bufalo Keaulana (Hawaii) seventh.

## A passing show

ORLANDO, Fla. (UPI) — Buster O'Brien passed for four touchdowns and ran for another last night to lead Richmond to a 49-42 victory over previously unbeaten and untied Ohio University in a wild Tangerine Bowl football game.

O'Brien put on a wide-open passing show for the 16,114 fans as he hit 39 passes out of 58 attempts for 447 yards, hitting on scoring tosses of 24, five, 12 and 15 yards. He also raced 31 yards on an option play for a score.

The performance by O'Brien, a graduate student who was ruled eligible for

the post-season game by the NCAA after Richmond appealed an earlier ruling, overshadowed the Ohio University passing combination of quarterback Cleve Bryant and split end Todd Snyder.

BRYANT HIT Snyder with three scoring passes of 48, 45 and three yards and ran seven yards for another score. He also hit Davie Leveck late in the game with a three yard scoring pass.

Jim Livesay pulled in two scoring passes of 24 and 15 yards from O'Brien, while Jim Crenshaw caught a 12-yard scoring pass and Walter Gillette one of five yards.

Richmond halfback Joe Kellum scored two touchdowns for the Spiders on runs of one and four yards. Mike Dussault kicked seven straight extra points.

O'Brien was named the game's most valuable back and the most-valuable-line-man-award went to Gillette who caught 19 passes for 222 yards.

Bryant, whose roll-out passing kept the Bobcats within striking distance to the end, hit on 17 of 33 passes for 245 yards.
