**POLICE SAID** the accident occurred while Selleck was giving his stepson a driving lesson. According to AP, Selleck told Chandlee that the accident occurred when the stick shift on the Jeep stuck.

According to a spokesman for the Outrigger club, the Jeep went through the third-floor railing and landed on its nose in an asphalt-covered area, smashing the front of the vehicle.

Police yesterday said Selleck's stepson had no driver's license or learner's permit and an investigation would be conducted. This morning, however, officers were trying to decide if an investigation is appropriate since the accident occurred on private property.

Police said state law requires all motorists to have licenses or permits but the code isn't clear if the requirement applies to private property as well as public highways.

**TRAFFIC LT.** Carl Wong said "our view is you have to have a license to operate a motor vehicle anywhere in the state. That view, however, is not shared by all."

Wong said the state attorney general's office several years ago was asked for an opinion on the subject by the police department and said the law probably applied only to public roads.

Police, however, sometimes do issue citations to drivers without licenses on private roads, Wong said.

Yesterday's accident has stirred new interest in the law at the police department and officials there were researching the problem today.

"It's a little premature right now to say whether we'll be taking action on it," patrol Capt. Leslie Moon said.
